Structure, governance and management

Reforestation Scotland (RS) is a company limited by guarantee with the liability of the members limited to £1 each. The company is governed by its memorandum and articles of association and is a registered Scottish charity.

Directors are elected annually at the AGM or co-opted by the directors until the next AGM when they can stand for election. Staff and contractors are appointed as appropriate and are allocated a 'link director' with whom they discuss all significant matters relating to their area of work. The directors meet regularly to discuss strategic and operation issues.

The directors are aware of the major risks affecting the organisation and are of the opinion that suitable control mechanisms are in place to mitigate those risks.

Objectives and activities

The principal objectives of the charity are;

- To promote education, and in particular to conduct research into, and promote public awareness and understanding of, the role of woodland restoration in the stabilisation and regeneration of ecosystems;
- To promote the principals of ecologically sound sustainable forestry practice for the rural communities of Scotland;
- To carry out work to provide, maintain, restore or improve public amenity woodlands, parks and other green spaces; or structures and access or interpretation works (including paths, signs, information boards etc.) within such places, in the vicinity of landfill sites and elsewhere in Scotland;
- To advance forest culture and heritage in Scotland;
- To advance physical and mental health through improving public access to forests and the natural environment;
- To advance community development, particularly by involving communities in the management of natural assets.

Achievements and performance

Core activities

We published two editions of our Journal, on the subjects of Climate Change and Working With The Wild, and two issues of our members' newsletter, the Radical Rowan. We held a very successful virtual gathering this year and hope to return to our usual two-day "real" gathering next year.

Hutting

Across Northern Europe, a tradition of small, simple huts in forest areas provides a connection for urban workers to nature and the countryside. Unfortunately, Scotland's developing hutting tradition was strangled by a combination of the most unequal land ownership pattern in Europe and planning laws that made no distinction between a hut and a large building. Reforestation Scotland has led a modern revival in interest in hutting, with online forums, talks, training events and several 'Hutters' Rallies'.

Crucially, we have managed to get the law changed so that huts are now a separate category in planning with a less onerous process for building standards. In 2018 we published "The Good Practice Guide to Hut Building", which builders will have to observe if they want to benefit from the exemptions for hutting. Since we were given this role by the Scottish Government, we have been able to make sure that there is an emphasis on sustainability in modern hutting, with huts defined as small, mostly off-grid structures made of sustainable materials and able to be completely removed at the end of their lives.

We have been developing a demonstration hutting community at Carnock in Fife. This has involved negotiating a site with the Forestry Commission, obtaining planning permission and facilitating the formation of a community. The remaining four Carnock Hutters have been coming together regularly to agree the lease with FLS, set up the Limited Company and other legal paperwork. A number of people have expressed an interest in having a hut at Carnock, so the group is expected to expand again soon to its full complement of twelve. It is expected that the lease will be signed late August and work on the car park takes place in September with a view to huts being built in spring next year. The support group continues to be supportive when called upon.

During 2020 lockdowns we ran several online events, including one as part of Book Week Scotland, with Lesley Riddoch, which then led to a series of online Fireside Chats about hutting, plus two sessions on how to buy a small woodland, with speaker Adrian Searle.

We continued to maintain our social media presence, sharing information and answering questions about hutting.

We were approached by a member with the idea of constructing and running a "hut of wellbeing" for short term breaks for people going through difficult phases of their lives, and have been working with a group of volunteers to develop this concept.

Land Revival Tour

Reforestation Scotland began around 25 years ago with a study tour to southern Norway, an area with a similar climate and population to Scotland but a different pattern of land ownership and land use and far more forest cover. The tour deliberately included a diverse group of people, from farmers, foresters and ecologists to politicians, writers and artists. A broad vision of what might be possible for Scotland emerged from this tour.

In 2018 and 2019 we ran similar tours of Scotland, visiting sites at the cutting edge of ecological restoration and community development to see how much of that vision has been realised. The aims of the tours were to inspire a new generation (most attendees of the tours were under 40) and nurture connections between different sectors in Scottish land use, which is notoriously divided into silos. The learning from the tours will be disseminated in videos, Journal articles and a narrative report.

A further tour was planned for 2020 but did not go ahead.

Policy

RS provides input to policy debates relevant to our vision.

We support, both financially and with members' time, the Forest Policy Group, a think tank which produces expert papers and organises conferences promoting sustainable forestry policy, in a debate often dominated by industry, landowning and bloodsport interests.

Rewilding

We have been promoting the idea of rewilding, or restoring natural processes to the landscape through large-scale habitat restoration and species reintroduction. We have also been closely involved in discussions between a wide range of conservation and countryside groups which resulted in the formation of The Scottish Rewilding Alliance.

Publicity, debate and information

RS aims to stimulate public debate and provide information in a range of ways. As well as the study tours mentioned above we maintain a series of websites and have produced publications on practical topics such as wood fuel use and local native tree nurseries. We moderate a group of Facebook discussion groups on reforestation, rewilding, hutting, coppicing and wood stoves.

RS promotes forest gardening, a way of growing food that imitates the structure of a forest and has a much more positive ecological impact than traditional food production. We have a display on the subject that has gone around various events and a website, Of Plums and Pignuts, giving information on the technique.

Tree planting

Despite our name, Reforesting Scotland is not primarily a tree planting organisation, but rather a network of people involved in such projects. However, we do have a small tree-planting grant which is aimed at supporting small, people-led projects which might not meet the criteria for state grants. We have supported projects all over the country.

Student Bursaries

We provided 6 bursaries (of up to £200 each) last year and have put the programme on hold. We hope to reopen later in 2021.

Other matters

RS membership has been growing steadily in recent years. Membership is now 702 (687 last year).

Financial review

Income for the year was £34,863 and expenditure £36,434, leaving a deficit of £1,571.

The board reviewed its financial reserves policy in 2015/16 and concluded that it would aim to hold unrestricted funds of between £20,000 and £30,000 to allow it to run projects where grant funding is receivable in arrears and to cope with sudden changes to significant income streams. Unrestricted funds ended the year at £63,315.

Plans for future periods

We aim to embark on new stages of our existing projects, further bursaries for students doing projects on ecological regeneration, grants for small scale tree planting schemes, finalising the agreement between the Carnock hutters and the Forestry Commission and fundraising for the hut of wellbeing - though acknowledge that there will be disruption due to Covid 19.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Reforesting Scotland

Year Ended 31 March 2021

I report to the trustees on my examination of the financial statements of Reforesting Scotland ('the charity') for the year ended 31 March 2021.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As the trustees of the company (and also its directors for the purposes of company law) you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 ('the 2005 Act'), the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Companies Act 2006 ('the 2006 Act'). You are satisfied that the accounts of the company are not required by charity or company law to be audited and have chosen instead to have an independent examination.

Having satisfied myself that the accounts of the company are not required to be audited under Part 16 of the 2006 Act and are eligible for independent examination, I report in respect of my examination of the charity's accounts carried out under section 44(1)(c) of the 2005 Act. 

1. General Information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is 39 Corstorphine Hill Avenue, Edinburgh, EH12 6LF.

2. Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going Concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Disclosure Exemptions

The charity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemptions available under paragraph 1.12 of FRS 102:

- (a) No cash flow statement has been presented for the charity.
- (b) Disclosures in respect of financial instruments have not been presented.

Judgements and Key Sources of Estimation Uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund Accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:-

- unrestricted general funds, which can be used in accordance with any of the charitable objects at the discretion of the directors.

- restricted funds, which can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources Expended

Resources expended are included in the accounts on an accruals basis inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered, as the charity is not VAT registered.

Financial Instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at the carrying value plus accrued interest less repayments. The financing charge to expenditure is at a constant rate calculated using the effective interest method.

4. Limited by Guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital. Each member's guarantee liability is limited to £1.
